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It has been a busy sporting term during the Summer Term. It began all the way back in April when Cromwell's Netball Team qualified for the county finals. They won their pool and then sadly lost in the final. Once they arrived at the county finals, they showed great determination, respect and resilience and were a wonderful example of the Cromwell Way.

May was a busy month for sports in Year 3 and Year 4. First, teams of 4 children attended an orienteering competition in which they followed a trail and solved clues around Hinchingbrooke School and house. The children really enjoyed the opportunity to show off all their knowledge and orienteering skills.

A mixed team of Key

Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 children attended the inaugural Ten Pin Bowling Event at Eat N Bowl in St Neots. 80 children from 10 primary schools travelled to the event, where all 16 lanes were booked with teams of 4-6 children aiming to gain the highest average score for their school! Cromwell finished 3rd in what was an extremely competitive field.

children attended a Tri-Golf competition in which they had the opportunity to rotate around a variety of golf related activities and challenges. With fantastic weather and the opportunity for parents and siblings to attend, it made for a wonderful event.

The final event in May was a Tennis festival in which a team from Years 3 and 4 represented Cromwell. The event was hosted by St Neots Tennis Club and aimed to target children new to the game of tennis. The event gave the children the opportunity to rotate around 8 different activity stations, with fun games such as: coconut shy, target tennis, bounce about and fast forehands.

As June came around, the focus shifted to Year 5 and Year 6. The First event was the QuadKids Athletics event in which 4 boys and 4 girls compete in 4 disciplines: a long distance (600m) run, 75m sprint, a vortex throw and a standing long jump. All competitors' scores are amalgamated, resulting in a team score.

The next event was the NFL Flag Football Competition in which the 'Cromwell Giants' competed. The competition followed a round robin format, allowing the schools to play every other school; followed by the top 4 placed schools progressing through to semi-finals; finishing with a final. The round robin matches were extremely close, with Cromwell showcasing their knowledge and understanding of the game. As the event progressed the children become more confident with the rules and further excelled.

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Learning Lens...

Reception

In Reception, we have been completing wild challenges as part of our outdoor learning sessions. The challenges included making magic wands from grass, grass trumpets, and nature crown. We also had a trip to the country park to see the bees where the beekeepers were able to show the children the inside of the hives. We found out why the bees are so important to growing fruits and vegetables. We also learnt that bees communicate with each other by doing a wiggle dance.





In Topic we have been learning about the Royal family. We had been watching different royal weddings to develop children's knowledge of the members of the Royal family. We explored different weddings as part of our RE lessons and to further children's understanding of a Christian wedding we had our own 'mock' wedding. The class travelled on the local bus into Huntingdon where they had a full wedding at All Saints church

Year 1



During our Summer term Year One have been learning about the Ancient Egyptians. We have explored many parts of their lives and cultures and learnt lots of interesting facts, like; did you know it took the Egyptians 17 years to build just one pyramid?! And did you know the Egyptians would mummify their dead by removing their organs and putting them in Canopic Jars?! We had a go at making our own Canopic Jars using playdough and clay - but we left out the organs! We have been building bridges over the River Nile, dressing up like Pharohs, rescuing mummies trapped in sand,

writing secret codes in hieroglyphics and building our own pyramids.

We also had our very own Egyptians Banquet – We all made headdresses and became Kings and Queens for the afternoon and feasted on foods that the REAL Egyptians would have eaten. Some of us were very brave and we tried figs, dates, hummus and pita, plums, peas and honey. We had lots of fun being Kings and Queens for the afternoon and were very full after our feast!

Year 2

Year 4

This term Year 4 have taken full advantage of the improved weather and got outside at every opportunity. We were very excited to receive a video message from the author of The Land of Roar series encouraging us to write our own fantasy stories. To really get a feel for the magical setting, we took a walk down to Hinchingbrooke country park to create our own fantasy maps- we also got out in the sunshine to roleplay parts of the story to improve our dialogue writing. In science we have enjoyed learning about a range of scientists and testing their theories; a particular favourite was throwing parachuted toys from the top of the castle! Our final topic this term has been Rivers and we kicked it off with a trip down to Brampton Mill. We were very lucky with the weather and were able to see a wide range of wildlife (and wave at some boats). Finally, the Year 4 children did themselves incredibly proud in the Musical Extravaganza proving that even a lovely, polite class can turn into a horde of revolting children with a bit of practice!







Year 5

We have been busy in class learning about Asia and specifically Japan. The physical and human Geography of the area is fascinating especially when comparing it to our country. As scientists this half term we have been asking questions about air resistance and exploring how a change in an objects shape can affect the behaviour of air particles. We then linked this to water resistance.

In P.E we have been improving our ball handling skills through netball and have developed our team skills though good communication on the court.

Our R.E has been very special, as members of our class have shared their beliefs and how having a faith for them has positively impacted their lives.



We also had the opportunity to visit Duxford to remind ourselves of our WW1 learning.





Learning Lens...

Year 6

It has been an exciting final term for Year 6 at Cromwell Academy. We have been learning about North and South America and have created climate graphs, used maps, and identified both physical and human geography. We have also created models of different landmarks in New York City including the One World Trade Center and the Empire State Building. In Art, we created our own Banksy-inspired artwork as well as an imitation of his artwork. We investigated the 9/11 attacks and the causes of these attacks and the impacts that we still feel today. In Science, we investigated circuits and created our own circuits as well as drawing these circuits accurately. As part of Science week, we also created our own bridges using paper and tape. As part of the Musical Showcase, we performed songs from the Greatest Showman including: "The Greatest Show", "This is Me", "The Other Side" and "A Million Dreams". We also had a wonderful time at our residential during which we paddle boarded, rock climbed and canoed amongst other activities. The children also performed admirably in their SATs tests and the whole school was very proud of each and every one of them.

Finally, it seems as though we are starting to return to some kind of normality. Cromwell Academy's staff have worked tirelessly to help our children catch up after the disruption of the last few years, and the most recent data suggest that their efforts have paid off. In the lower years of the school, the focus has been on re-teaching the children how to learn, and early signs are that this is indeed the quickest way of getting them to where they need to be.

Thank you for the support you have given to the school over the years. I'll continue to follow Cromwell Academy's exciting journey once I've returned to civilian life!

School Uniform Reminder

We continue to pay particular attention to setting and maintaining the high standards that we are proud of at Cromwell Academy- this includes high standards of presentation in both uniform and work. As normality resumes, we wish to take this opportunity to reinforce the uniform expectations and expect that, as much as possible, these high expectations will be back in place following this period of difficulty.



Children are expected to be suitably dressed for the variety of indoor and outdoor activities in school.

Our school uniform is outlined below:

Only small stud earrings are allowed to be worn in school. Please remove earrings on PE days before school. Children will not be allowed to participate in PE if they cannot remove their own earrings. If you plan to have your child's ears pierced, we strongly urge you to arrange this for the start of the 6-week summer holiday so that this does not impact on participation in PE.

We encourage all of our students to take pride in their uniform and to have a high standard of personal appearance. We also encourage them to take responsibility for their own appearance. They should always help to create a positive first impression of the school both within and outside the school. We believe that our uniform is smart and practical to wear and we will always endeavour to provide the best value for money.

All hair that is below shoulder length or that covers the eyes should be tied back during the school day.

Extreme hairstyles and/or accessories are not permitted in school. Please avoid elaborate hair accessories that may distract pupils during their learning.

Your support as parents /carers is critical in enabling us to uphold the policy consistently and effectively to ensure the highest of standards.

If you plan to have your child's ears pierced— we urge you to take the opportunity as early as possible at the start of the summer break. This will ensure minimal disruption to participation in PE.

Only **small stud earrings** are allowed to be worn in school.

PLEASE REMOVE EARRINGS ON PE DAYS **BEFORE** COMING TO SCHOOL

Please remember to let the office know any updates or changes to telephone/mobile numbers, addresses and any medical information.

We open our school gates in the morning at 8.40.

Please remember that **doors open at 8.40 and close promptly at 8.50.** Once classroom doors have been closed, you will not be permitted onto site and will be directed to the office entrance. This is to ensure all children are registered correctly for school meals and safeguarding purposes.

For reasons of safety and courtesy, a further polite request for parents not to park in any of the hospital car parks, in front of residents driveways, on the double yellow lines or in congested areas around the school entrances.

PLEASE do not allow your child to cycle or scoot on the school playground at school drop off/pick up time. Our school children know this rule and we would like parents' support in encouraging younger siblings to do the same.

Children must not play on the school play equipment before or after school—this is due to insurance reasons and we ask parents to support us in this.
